

Front Cover: The engineer of GP7 503 has just throttled up on a local passenger at Nashville Union Station in the early '50s. The 503 was nicknamed a "torpedo boat" unit by railfans, owing to its air reservoirs mounted on top instead of above the fuel tank (to allow space for 1100 gallons of boiler water capacity for the dual-service unit's steam generator).
